

Minister's Letter April 2018: Spiritually Blind

How would you rate your own spiritual sight and hearing? Are your values and ideas based on scriptural truths, cultural values or blind presumptions? God has been talking to me lately about how some become spiritually enlightened while others, even with the same opportunities, remain "blind".

A minister friend asked me how I coped "with those who never seem to get it; you know, the ones who are more interested in the old words of the LORD's prayer or the type of worship songs they consider appropriate and the like." I replied "it is of course part of the mystery of God and the things of God. Also we humans close our eyes and ears spiritually, and permit wrong ideas, these are surely primary factors in this."

The discussion continued, "at least attending events sometimes, is better than never looking to God at all" I said. "How can God reach those who never make any time or space for the vital spiritual opportunities? Those that permit life changing experiences which He delights to give to those who truly and honestly want to have Him in their lives?" he replied.

Then preparing for our new study into Romans, I sensed that this could be another opportunity for some to set apart a little time each month to consider truths of God; not just any set of truths, but life-changing ones. 
As well as how much we let God in, graciously God does work in the other direction. He makes all the first moves towards us, He gives us second, third and many more chances to turn to Him. He will never force us, but like a loving parent, He stands with arms wide open waiting for His child to run in for an embrace - a relationship which is tangible and which can grow deep.

The Psalmist wrote, Truly my soul finds rest in God; my salvation comes from him. Psalm 62:1

People go to paradise islands, or into the wilderness to "enjoy peace", but the deep spiritual peace is only found in God, Jesus and with the Holy Spirit.

In Romans 6 it says, For "Everyone who calls on the name of the LORD will be saved." ¹⁴ But how can they call on him to save them unless they believe in him? £350,000 Restoration of Stonework and Stained Glass Improvement of Disabled Access Modernised Exhibition of Church's Heritage

At last we have clearance to start this work and it is anticipated that scaffolding will be erected around the Church by early April. The work involved is programmed to last about 8 months. During that time there will be a temporary contractor's site accommodation erected, probably on the parking setts at the south end of the Church.

The work will be carried out on weekdays with the weekends being free of workmen. There will still be parking available during the week although the contractor will be bringing to the site equipment and materials on lorries.

Additionally, members of the Church and local History Society are developing and implementing proposals to modernise and expand the exhibition of the Church's heritage. This will be displayed in the Apse (the area behind the pulpit). Disabled access to that area of the Church will be created by the construction of a ramp inside the North side of the Church.

# Article Series 9 (pt 1) Introduction to the book of Romans - SIN, Salvation, Sanctification, Sovereignty and Service

Please pray before you read Romans (1 chapter every 2 days or so)

Try keeping a journal of the things you like, the questions it raises, the things you don't understand, any new understanding etc.

Having completed Daniel, God is now taking us through the book of Romans. It is considered to be **the most important letter** that anyone could ever read. Many scholars consider it to be a masterpiece which gives **the clearest and fullest explanation of the gospel in the Bible**.

Calvin said about it, "If one comprehends it, a road will be open to understand the whole of scripture". William Tyndale proposed that every Christian should learn it off by heart. But watch out, once you read and study this book, if you open up to God as you read it, the chances are you will never be the same again - but instead you'll be better, richer, and spiritually more illuminated. Notably Augustine was converted as he read it for the first time. He wrote, "a clear light flooded into my heart, and all the darkness and doubt vanished away". Martin Luther said of Romans, "I began to grasp the truth that the righteousness of God is that righteousness whereby, through GRACE and SHEER MERCY, He justifies US by faith. Thereupon I felt myself being reborn and to have travelled through the open door into paradise" From then on his teaching brought new meaning for his students and two years later, he was pinning his thesis on the Castle church door in Wittenberg. The Protestant Reformation began there as a progressive result of this book being opened up for Luther by God.

Here is a brief overview :-

- 1. Ch 1:18 3:20 : **Sin**, the need for salvation as God is holy so He condemns sin as it is spiritually and eternally deadly. Righteousness is required. God's righteousness is in His Law, but we are all slaves to sin in our human nature.
- 2. Ch 3:21 5:21 : **Salvation**, the way of salvation through God's grace. God's design of grace to **justify** sinners, crediting Christians as righteous and how God **imputes** righteousness to believers who walk daily guided by His Spirit.
- 3. Ch 6:1 8:39: **Sanctification** and the life of salvation through God's action. How God demonstrated righteousness and how we are to obey and serve God.
- 4. Ch 9:1 11:36 : **Sovereignty**, the scope of salvation: Jew and Gentile. God's promises being fulfilled as righteousness is restored to His people and by *election*.
- 5. Ch 12:1 16:27: **Service:** salvation calls us to service for God's glory and the salvation of others. The paths we travel with the righteousness applied and the demonstration of God's righteousness so that we turn new spiritual understanding into active effective service for the King of Kings towards others.

## TEEN PAGE..... Psalm 23 "The Lord is my Shepherd"

On a number of occasions over the years, I've heard people saying that the Bible is not relevant. Often a view that is prevalent amongst the young. Many believe it is a collection of far-fetched stories or a book full of judgement and "thou shalt nots". In the new technological age, where communication is via social media, delivered in short bites, that viewpoint is easy to understand. You have tweets with limited characters, photos that disappear after a few seconds, blogs and vlogs, facetime and Skype, snap chats and whatsapps and the latest celebrities are youtubers.

So when we read Psalm 23, one of the best known sections of scripture, how can it be relevant, how can describing God as a shepherd mean anything to young people in this sci-fi techno era?

It may help you, to re-interpret the words in your thoughts. So what is God to you? Here are some examples from Christians around the globe: Latin America — "The Lord is my friend, he helps me find work each day" Russia — "the Lord is my taxi driver, he helps me get safely through the streets of Moscow"

Australia — "The lord is my loving mother, she takes care of me all day long" India — "The Lord is my Guru, he teaches me what I need to know"

To understand this verse better, we need to look more closely at the author. David was a shepherd. He cared for his sheep in the most hostile environments. He guided them through dangerous terrain. He ensured they were fed and watered in arid deserts. He fought off predators. If one went missing, he'd seek it out. It was his purpose, his responsibility; the flock relied entirely on him. No matter what happened, the shepherd stayed with the sheep and actively worked for their best interest. Have you experienced these things in your relationship with the Lord? *If not you're losing out!* 

Psalm 23 is beautifully written, full of re-assurance, love, peace, tranquillity, healing, righteousness, protection and salvation. As David needed these in his day, surely we need them equally today.

So as time moves on, ideas change and evolve, humans become more advanced, but do our needs change? We still need the elements demonstrated in this Psalm.

While everything around us may change, we can be reassured that God does not. In Exodus 3 we read about another man tending his flock. When God appears to Moses in the burning bush, he tells him "I am who I am".

Take some time to read this Psalm carefully, translating each line into your own experience.

I pray that you will experience God's blessing through this.

## **April Prayer Letter by Douglas McClintick**

Over the last few weekends prior to writing this letter, I have been blessed to have had the opportunity to go on two weekends away; the Veterinary Christian Fellowship Northern Conference and Carlisle Baptist's Young Adults Group weekend. These have been great opportunities to network with other Christians from a variety of backgrounds; spending time together worshipping God, studying the Bible and having fun. It has been a wonderful reminder of how the whole Church genuinely can be one big family, over and above the fellowship we have as a congregation here at Dunbar. It is as Jesus describes in Matthew 12:49-50; "Here are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of my Father in heaven is my brother and sister and mother."

For many however, the Church does not feel like a family. We pray that in these situations there would be opportunities for reconciliation and relationship-building; for all of us to have the discernment to reach out to those who are isolated, hurting or alone. We also ask that as a Church we would have the courage to engage in the more difficult aspects of being a family: acting sacrificially and holding one another accountable. LORD give us guidance and wisdom as we serve you together in this we **pray**.


LORD Jesus we **pray** for initiatives such as Passing the Baton, which aim to combat the isolation and loneliness which makes individuals vulnerable to homelessness. We give thanks for its befriending service, for the volunteers that spend time with those who are socially vulnerable. LORD bless these meetings and be present there. We ask Lord that, through this work, hope and opportunity would abound for those who are most in need of a positive change in their circumstances. Thank you also, Father, for the Cinnamon Network and Bethany Christian Trust who provide support for Passing the Baton as well as many other social initiatives.

We give thanks for other charities such as Livability and Linking Lives UK which look to foster social connections for people who are in the most challenging circumstances for being able to maintain or build their personal relationships. May Your Hand work through these organisations and their generous volunteers to rebuild communities and to challenge loneliness caused by poverty, disability, bereavement or broken relationships. Most of all we ask that You, Jesus, would be made known to all involved. May they know that the one person who will never forsake them, will love them and will always be there for them is You.

Finally, the advent of social media has appeared to result in the problems of isolation and loneliness growing as increasing numbers of people trade the intimacy and depth of physical friendships for more superficial virtual connections. We therefore pray LORD that there would be a recognition of the value of personal contact and communication. Help us to remember this in our relationship with You, that we would take the time to **experience You personally** and to just be still in your presence.

#### How Is Your OUT Doing? - By Shiona Liddle

All sorts of good things come in triangles: Dairylea cheese, Doritos and, best of all, Toblerone! In our youth mentoring group Adam, Lewis and I are habitually asking ourselves questions based on the following diagram.



In my role as Pioneer Minister I am often concerned with the OUT side of the triangle, asking questions like: 'who am I connecting with in our community - who am I helping take one step closer to Jesus?' That's one of the reasons I go to Slimming World every Thursday at 5.30 - I'm making new friends as well as losing weight and eating more healthily. Other places I meet people are Basics Bank where we eat soup together and have conversations and also The Hungry Hatch – the fortnightly community meal run by the Ridge Café in Bleachingfield. I've also made 1650 my default café in town (mostly) so that I can begin to know the regulars.

At my recent Forge pioneer training weekend in Chester we met with a group of evangelists at the Light Project in Chester.

They encouraged us to be more intentional about connecting with people in very simple, everyday ways. When you are in a shop why not ask the assistant: 'how is your day going?' It's amazing the kind of conversations that open up from a simple, caring acknowledgement of someone serving you. We were also tasked with choosing an object and praying about who to give it to. Our pair chose a small wooden plaque with the words: 'you are doing a great job' written on it. Then we walked the town, asking God who to give it to. A lovely smiley fruit shop assistant had her day brightened by the brief encouraging conversation and the gift of the plaque.

A visit to Lush (a soap and skincare shop) led to a very natural conversation with a helpful young shop assistant who brought up the idea of spirituality. He was already open - all we had to do was connect. He was beaming after a brief prayer of blessing. Our evangelist trainers explained that people in this post-Christian culture are all at different stages of closeness to Jesus. Our job is just to help them step a little nearer by showing them that God is good and we care. That really takes the pressure off!

It is all about being intentional. Start to identify where you go on a regular basis and who you meet there. Pray that you will be led into natural conversations which might or might not lead to talking about Jesus. Don't force it. Trust that you will be led. You will be surprised at what happens when you keep your antennae up!

#### Join us in the OUT

As an exercise in the OUT dimension of the triangle, Adam, Lewis and I are choosing an object each and praying about who to give it to. Simple and a little bit scary. Please ask us how we get on.

**Hugs & Hot Cross Buns**. Then there is the opportunity to bless our town as we give out free hugs and hot cross buns on Easter Saturday from 10am-12 noon outside the town house. This is a joint venture with St Anne's and the aim is to bless, to start to change the atmosphere of the town and perhaps people's perceptions of Christians and church.

**Light & Life Fair.** Another low-key way to introduce friends or neighbours might be to invite them to our Light and Life evening on **April 27**<sup>th</sup> at The Royal British Legion at 7.30pm. In the meantime, keep your antennae up and remember the OUT.
