

Minister's Letter November 2018: Is it not fair?

The summer seems to have loitered through into autumn but it is finally fading into winter. There is a purpose in the seasons, they are never the same and each year brings differences. We don't get to make the rules and while we have had a very dry and pleasant year, many people have experienced lower crop yields, difficulties and even disasters.

Humanity often complains that it does not have control over things, though often seems to believe that it has the solutions. Often with each new proposal there are additional issues, more damage and injustice occur.

Mankind's inhumanity to his "neighbour" is seen in many and varied ways. Cries of "It is not fair" are often true reflections of experience and reality. Relying upon people often exposes corruption or dishonest agendas. Relying upon God however is rock solid and wise.

God is fair. He is just. He is just truly amazing, perfectly loving, patient, merciful, worth knowing and is the only viable solution to our predicament.

Yet we often put our trust in other things: wealth, pleasure, vague or unsubstantiated hope that we will be all right when our time on earth is over, some good works, doing our religious duty now and again etc.

In Deuteronomy 32:4 Moses describes God thus, "The Rock! His work is perfect, for ALL His ways are just; a God of faithfulness and without injustice, righteous and upright is He. Isn't that fabulous?

Given that every single one of us sins, who can stand before this fair, just and holy God? The Prophet Nahum (1:6) puts it like this, "Who can endure His fierce anger? His wrath is poured out like fire; the rocks are shattered before Him".

I personally love the irony of an atheist who tries to blame God to challenge a Christian's beliefs. Once that is pointed out, their next attempt often is to talk about Him being vengeful or uncaring in the face of suffering.

However, once you get to know Him personally, once you discover all that He reveals in His Word of truth, then there is nothing to appropriately criticise any of God's abundant and phenomenal characteristics.

The character Job was dealt an awful hand, after many years of incredible blessing. When he thought he would take it up in court with God, he soon realised that his own thinking was inadequate in the face of His creator:-

In Job 42:3, Job says, "Surely I spoke of things I did not understand, things too wonderful for me to know." God wants us to know lots of good things about Him. Will we make time for Him? Agape *Gordon*

Article Series 9 (pt 6) Stubborn and Unrepentant Exposed

Please pray before you read Romans 2:1-16 Storing up God's wrath Last time we began to look at the consequences of depraved, sinful behaviour. This time we consider the principles that govern God's judgment. These are (i) Truth v2; (ii) Deeds v6-11; and (iii) The LIGHT a person has v12-15. The truth can set you free, but it can also condemn. Often people who condemn others are hypocrites themselves v1-3. Paul says they therefore condemn themselves by their hypocritical judgments and have no excuse. This is the ivory tower mentality, we are okay, but they are bad. Yet all sin is abhorrent to God. However, when God judges, He does so truthfully and He is never hypocritical. God judges all hypocrisy, and the "when you" in v3 means that we inevitably will be guilty of this.

Next, v4 we hear of God's mercy and plan of leading us to repentance. God's punishments are designed in order for good to prevail. God's discipline is kind, loving etc. To rely purely on God's love or kindness, with no heart to honour Him however is foolish. The "tolerance" of God means He holds back His final judgment to permit us a limited "patience" time to respond appropriately. God's "kindness" here means that He helps us to see that going against His ways is greatly unattractive. He kindly helps us to shun sins; temptation has less power. Opposing God brings punishment, obeying His word offers unimaginable rewards. Failing to repent makes a sinner's heart hard and cold, and it will be a dreadful waste, "storing up wrath" as all will be "revealed" v5, 8. Our account needs to be settled with God v6. What have we done with our life? How have we lived? Salvation is by the grace of God alone. Yet, our deeds are important and show who we are serving and what are our motivations.

A spiritual life that is persistent and consistent is vital v7. Trusting not in good works, but in God. Our goal is to walk closely with Him. v9, 10 contrasts those who will face great distress for their failure to repent with the glory, honour and peace that those who repent truly will enjoy for all eternity. God does not show any favouritism. He is impartial and fair v11.

God revealed Himself first to the Jews. They have been enlightened to His attributes, power and love, long before other nations v12, 14, 15. Although Jews are supposed to have God's Law written on their hearts, the rest of us can show by our conduct, that God's Law is written on our hearts too. Jews won't surely have kept the Law perfectly, and the rest of us cannot claim salvation because we were not given it as the Jews were. Both can suffer the consequences of sin which is not dealt with through genuine repentance. Obedience to God's ways is essential v13, otherwise we cannot be right with God. Knowing right and doing right is right.

Nothing is hidden from God v16. All will be revealed on the Day of Judgment. It is His truth that counts and our behaviour, actions or inactions which matter. Knowing that God is fair and more than willing to help offers us real and practical solutions. **Store up treasures which last!** Yours in Christ Gordon

TEEN PAGE... PERSONAL EVANGELISM

In **Matthew 28:19**, we are instructed to "Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations" so whether we like it or not, we must be involved in some form of personal evangelism. So why do most of us find it so difficult?

One family thought they had better do something to witness for Jesus. So they invited their neighbours to dinner. When it came to the meal, the family were keen to show their neighbours that they were Christians. So the 5-year-old son was asked to say grace. "I don't know what to say" There was an awkward pause, then the mother said, "Just say what Daddy said at breakfast this morning." Obediently, the boy repeated, "Oh God, we've got those bad people coming to dinner tonight."

Sometimes, when we try to plan opportunities or attempt things in our own strength, we flop miserably. So, without trying to engineer direct, deep, life-changing conversation, how can we evangelise?

In Colossians 4:5-6 we read:

"Live wisely among those who are not believers, and make the most of every opportunity. Let your conversation be gracious and attractive so that you will have the right response for everyone".

Those who don't believe in Jesus note what believers do. They make decisions about Christ by watching us. When we are kind, they assume Christ is kind. When we are gracious, they assume Christ is gracious. But if we are short tempered or dishonest, what will people think about our king? Courteous conduct honours Christ.

When you surrender a parking place, a space on the train, a place in the queue or a seat in the lecture theatre to someone, you honour him. When you return a borrowed book, you honour the lender. When you make an effort to include everyone in the room, especially the ones others may have been overlooked, you honour God's children.

One writer described life as "a series of never to be repeated opportunities"

What a thrilling mind-set to be in. Try looking at everything you do in life like this.

Don't just live your lives waiting for the "perfect" set of circumstances to come along, live every moment for Christ. By doing this, you are an evangelist!

The other day someone teased me that much of my ministry seems to involve eating. I am happy that this is true – I like my chuck! In a previous article I mentioned how sharing food around a table brings us together in a natural, friendly way and opens us up to new possibilities. So here are a few opportunities to do just that.

'The Big Q does Alpha'

There's a real buzz around the church hall these days. On Mondays our Big Q folks have decided to do the Alpha Course together – well, we were asking questions so it seemed a natural progression. Alpha is a 10-week course looking at the big questions around life, faith and meaning. At the time of writing we have just completed week 2: 'Who is Jesus?' We eat together then watch a 20-minute video then chat over the themes raised. Discussion is lively, thought-provoking and fun. This is the first Alpha Course I have led where the guests already know each other and I'm loving it! We have around 12 participants at the moment and the friendliness as people help set the table, serve each other and clear up is all part of a healthy community walking towards discipleship together. Please pray for us.

Sunny's Kitchen

Then there is our community meal in the hall - we call it Sunny's Kitchen. This is something we do alongside The Ridge. It's open doors for lunch once a month to supplement The Hungry Hatch community meal which happens every Monday at The Bleachingfield Centre at 5 pm. On Fridays, Sunny Soups are made at the hall to be frozen and put into the community freezer for those who fancy some home-made soup or pureed fruit fresh from the garden. And of course the Ploughmans' Lunch is another great place to eat...I'm paying you a visit this month sorry it took me so long.

'Tattie Table' Oikos

Every Wednesday fortnight our home group at Tim and Diana Greene's eat baked spuds with fillings and invite others to join in our rhythm of life. We say grace, we share the good and not so good stories of the past week then we look at a gospel story together asking: what does this story tell us about God, about people, would this story make you change anything in your life and who do you know who needs to hear this story? The group has a mix of people on the faith journey and aims to be inclusive and ever expanding. It only works because of the connections we are already making in the community and because we are always thinking of how we can accommodate the not-yet Jesus follower. Speaking of which... Sustaining Dunbar is having a bring and share meal this evening to talk about community resilience. I will be there. I love the fact that our town is developing this kind of culture both inside and outside of the church. It fascinates me to consider how we might join in and bring Jesus to the feast.
