

Ministers Letter October 2016: Salvation is necessary

So many people in our world are on a path of self-destruction. Whether it is by unhealthy diet, lack of exercise, alcohol, drugs, bad choices in relationships or one of the many other things you can add to this list. It would be fair to say that many need saved from themselves as well as from thoughts which often drive their desire for escape and folly.

To be honest, any one of us might be or could be in a bad place at various points in our lives. This world is a minefield. We don't get specific manuals for our teenage years, or for mid-life or for our twilight years, and none of us have perfect parents who teach us everything we need to know. Yet there is a guidebook for life; make sure you know that. The Bible does teach us how to live and what to choose to avoid self-destruction, hurting others and ourselves, and more importantly to avoid offending God.

Yet despite being readily available, many Bibles are not read sufficiently for the details or the full implications to be discovered. A Church that treats the Bible inappropriately declines. Conversely one which honours God is very likely to grow in so many ways. (See 1 Samuel 2:30)

One of which is when people, who truly seek God in their lives, encounter Him through His word and by His Spirit. As the Spirit convicts an individual, a miracle happens. We call that conversion or salvation. It is a momentous turning point, and it is essential for us, if we are to enter heaven for all eternity. It affects our lives on earth too. 1 John 5:12 says, Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life. So, salvation is necessary for life in the present and life eternally.

Every Christian arrives at a point where they realise that they need to be saved. They were sinful, selfish, burdened by guilt etc. Although conversion does not make us instantly and eternally perfect, for we become works in progress, it does make us eternally perfect through Jesus sacrifice for our sin. In addition, we should be growing in righteousness more and more as we live for Christ instead of for ourselves. Growing is essential in life.



Syria's Christian community is one of the oldest in the world, going back two millennia. The Bible tells us Paul met Jesus on the road to Damascus. Some Christians in Maaloula can still speak Aramaic, the language of Jesus.



What began as a popular uprising with demands for increased political freedom and economic reform has increasingly developed into a jihad against the Syrian government. Wars are waged within wars. The self-proclaimed Islamic State (IS) have claimed parts of Syria for their caliphate and other radical groups such as Jabhat al-Nsura attack those who don't conform to their brand of Islam. It is impossible to survive as a Christian in IS-controlled areas. Even in areas still controlled by the government, evangelism and conversion from Islam are illegal. Christians are not only caught in the violence of the on-going war in Syria, but are specifically targeted by Islamic extremists for attack, abduction and murder.

The Christian church in Syria knows that the real battle is not against flesh and blood. "The world uses bombs and rockets. We have a weapon that gives life: the Word of God, and prayer" says a pastor from Damascus.

Article Series 8 (pt 6) "The God who SAVES"

Please read *Daniel 3:16-30*: He alone is able to SAVE! Last time Nebuchadnezzar said "what god will be able to **rescue** you from my hand" v15. So he is either questioning whether God exists or he is speaking blasphemously. Blasphemy is being sacrilegious against God.

Do you stand up for yourself? Do you stand up for God? Sometimes it is fairly easy to stand strong and speak of God. At other times though, the pressure is more intense. Imagine being summoned before a king who can order your death in an instant. Would you boldly exclaim "the God we serve is able to save us"? v16, 17. In addition, is our faith in God so assured? - notice Daniel says "our God WILL rescue us"? Even if He did not, "we would still not worship your idol" Daniel asserts further v18. Their desire to honour God is more important than any absolute guarantee that God will intervene.

Boldness is easy from a position of power, but not so easy when humility is more likely to be expected from someone in higher authority. As we stand for God, and are faithful in our religious observance, He will grant us boldness as and when it is required. Yet although this boldness seems to create the worst reaction, faith in our **saving** God proves wise v19-24. God faithfully protects His own in moments like this. God is amazing v24 and does the miraculous. The arithmetic is correct, three go into the furnace, but there are four within - with God with us, there is always extra on our side. In v25 the King uses the phrase, "the fourth looks like a son of the gods." The implication is that an angelic creature or something less than God has gone into the furnace. Some Christians have wondered if Jesus was the forth person? In Hebrews we recently learned from faith witnesses who "quenched raging fire as they looked to Jesus". Most importantly there is no doubt either way that something of the divine is present here.

The result is that not only have the flames been quenched. So too has the fire of Nebuchadnezzar's wrath v26-28. Let's also remember that he had a dream about his kingdom being replaced eventually by an eternal one. Daniel had revealed this dream to him and Daniel speaks of his God who is all powerful and eternal. Last time it was a dream, but now there is visual and tangible evidence of this God which the king may previously have questioned the existence of. This is a seminal moment - the kind we all need as we are faced by the reality of our God and His plans for our lives.

So in v29 Nebuchadnezzar makes a new law, such that no one should be blasphemous towards Daniel's God, "for no other god can save" like He can. This is repentance. This is the humility that causes even kings to come to Jesus with the humility of a little child. He had opposed and even questioned God previously, but now He acknowledges God fully. He is brought down to earth, but lifted high towards heaven. God is willing to do this for us all too, whoever we are. Yours in bold confidence in Our God Gordon.

In this passage, Paul pleads with us that we should be united in love, elevating others over our own vanity and desires. Our belief and experiences of Jesus mean our focus should shift from a ME, MYSELF and I mentality, onto the bigger purposes of God and the needs of those around us. If we could find all this focus, what a powerful, prophetic and potentially world-changing perspective that would be! Here is a short prayer to consider: Glorious God, as I focus upon you, I pray that my perspective would be changed and my vision renewed. Help me to look beyond my own story to

your bigger purposes. Amen.

"Oh, no sir, I could never repay what your son did for me. It's a gift."

The father hung the portrait over his mantle. Every time visitors came to his home he took them to see the portrait of his son before he showed them any of the other great works he had collected. The man died a few months later. There was to be a great auction of his paintings. Many influential people gathered, excited over seeing the great paintings and having an opportunity to purchase one for their collection. On the platform sat the painting of the son.

The auctioneer pounded his gavel. "We will start the bidding with this portrait of the son. Who will bid for this painting?" There was silence. Then a voice shouted. "We want to see the famous paintings. Skip this one." But the auctioneer persisted. "Will someone bid for this painting? Who will start the bidding? \$100, \$200?" Another voice shouted angrily. "We didn't come to see this painting. We came to see the Van Goghs the Rembrandts. Get on with the real bids!" But still the auctioneer continued. "The son! The son! Who'll take the son?"

Finally, a voice broke the tention. It was the long-time gardener of the man and his son. "I'll give \$10 for the painting." Being a poor man, it was all he could afford. "We have \$10, who will bid \$20?" "Give it to him for \$10. Let's see the masters." "\$10 is the bid, I'll take \$20?"

The crowd was becoming angry. They didn't want the painting of the son. They wanted the more worthy investments for their collections. The auctioneer pounded the gavel. "Going once, twice, SOLD for \$10!" A man sitting on the second row shouted. "Now let's get on with the collection!" The auctioneer laid down his gavel.

"I'm sorry, the auction is over. When I was called to conduct this auction, I was told of a secret stipulation in the will. I was not allowed to reveal that stipulation until this time. Only the painting of the son would be auctioned. Whoever bought that painting would inherit the entire estate, including the paintings. The man who took the son gets everything!"

God gave his son 2,000 years ago to die on a cruel cross. Much like the auctioneer, His message today is, "The Son, the Son, who'll take the Son, and gain everything?"
